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CHAPTER ONE

1.0_INTRODUCTION

I am Lister in 1974 noted that schools fail to teach and most students spends years failing to learn things like Mathematics, science and french. He went further to say that in England, to reach the ordinary level of the General Certificate of Education was a highly extraordinary achievement. And in Italy, Dalbort Hallenstein in 1977 reported the accusations levelled against communist teachers in that country for contributing to persistent large-scale failures even through observers suspected that it was the system that was at fault rather then the teachers.

In Nigeria, there has been a hue and cry by members of the public over what is regarded as falling standard in Education. One notices that such complaints comes immediately after a release of the yearly West African School Certificate Examination Results. It stand to reason therefore that the notice of the falling standard of education could not be anything else other than the inability on the part of secondary school pupils to pass the school certificate examination or with higher grades.

All over the world, education as well as parents are becoming increasingly aware that the problem of what to teach, how to teach it and examine it has very much to do with educational systems of the world. Similarly educations are becoming increasingly aware that the children they teach do not learn the things we want them to learn as much. Added to

this, educators are now aware that there are some children who although having the ability to learn fast enough do not learn as much as they should, and a good number of this category of learners dropout of school.

We are similarly informed by research findings and through classroom experiences that a good number of the children we teach who fail to learn what they are expected to learn, and without any guidance coming from the teacher, abandon their learning half-way to escape from the ordeal which the classroom subjects them to. The simple cause of the problem of educational wastage in most countries of the world today, Nigeria not exempted, is that there has been the tendency for education not to do what they are supposed to and by the time it is done it is too late to have the appropriate impact on the learner.

A new National policy on Education for Nigeria was approved by the federal Government in 1979, but the policy dates back to the first National curriculum Conference in September 1969. The outcomes of that historic Conference were published in a book (Adaralegbe, 1970). In 1972, a high-powered committee consisting of educationist, University academics, Civil Servants, industrialist, and intellectual from various walks of life was set out under the chairmanship of Chief S. O Adebo, to study the report in depth and present recommendations based on it for formulation into a New National policy on Education (Federal Ministry of Information, 1971). In 1977, an implementation task force was set-up under

the chieftainship of the late professor S. D Onabamiro to prepare a blue print for the implementation of the policy. Input into the federal task force come from various state task force set-up for the purpose. The federal Government white paper on the report of the implementation task force came out in 1979 and constitute the basis of what is now the new national policy on education (Federal Ministry of Information, 1979).

One of the distinctive features of the New National policy on Education is its emphasis on continuous Assessment.

The following extract from the policy illustrates clearly this emphasis. For each extract, the sub-tittle and the paragraph numbers are indicated.

1.1 EXTRACTS FROM THE NATIONAL POLICY ON EDUCATION PHILOSOPHY (PARAGRAPH (7))

Education assessment and evaluation will be liberalised by basing them in whole or in part on continuous Assessment of the progress of the individual.

1.2 PRIMARY EDUCATION (Paragraph 15((8&2)

Government plans that progress along the educational cycle will be based on continuous overall guidance oriented assessment by teachers and headmasters. However, Government recognise the implication of the implementation of such a measure for teacher education and will accordingly ensure that programmes of pre-service teacher education in the teachers training colleges, and of in service training in the National

teachers institute and the institute of education, will incorporate training in the continuous assessment of pupils.

Government will work into the possibility of abolishing the primary school leaving certificate examination as soon as the processes for continuous assessment have been worked out and validated. Meanwhile, certification at this level of education will be based on continuous assessment and the result of the primary leaving certificate examination.

1.3 SECONDARY EDUCATION (Paragraph 23(1&2).

As an interim measure, the result system of National Common Entrance Examination will be allowed to continue until the junior secondary school system has taken off. The selection for entry into the secondary schools will, as soon as possible, be improved by incorporating Headmaster's continuous assessment into the common entrance examination result.

Junior Secondary School leaving Certificates will be based on the continuous assessment method.

1.4 RATIONALE FOR ADVOCATING CONTINUOUS ASSESSMENT

Some of the reasons for this advocacy of continuous assessment may be inferred from the policy statements, but there are other reasons not referred to in the National Policy on education. The following appears important for continuous assessment.

i) Assessment is an interim part of the teaching process. It is therefore reasonable that the teacher should be involved in the final assessment of the pupils he or she has

thought. The present system whereby the final assessment of the learner at the end of a particular level of education is done through a single examination set by an external body, tends to deny the teacher the opportunity to participate in the final assessment of his or her pupils.

- ii) An assessment procedure which takes into account the learner's performance through the entire period of school is likely to be more valid and more indicative of the learner's overall ability than a single examination.
- their teaching is often frustrated by the fact that a final external examination does not take account of such innovation. In a continuous assessment situation, the teacher's assessment of the performance of student's on such innovation can become a part of the final assessment. The teacher will therefore be encouraged to be flexible and innovative.
- iv) An important aspect of instruction is the appropriate guidance of the learner both in his or her learning and preparation for a career. A continuous assessment procedure facilitates such guidance functions in a school.
- v) A teacher also needs to assess his or her own instructional methods from time to time in order to improve his or her performance. Data from continuous assessment can be useful to the teacher from such self-assessment.
- vi) For several years, Nigeria and indeed many West African countries have been plagued with the occurrence of

examination leakages and other malpractices especially in the West African school certificate examinations. It has been suggested that the one reason for such a high incidence of examination malpractices is the fact that the single final examination is so crucial in deciding the future of the candidate that the temptation to ensure success by all means (fair or foul) is very high. It is believed that if continuous assessment is employed, this temptation would be considerably reduced.

1.5 PROBLEMS OF IMPLEMENTING CONTINUOUS ASSESSMENT

The second extract from the National Policy on Education shows that Government is aware that the implementation of the policy of continuous assessment poses certain significant problems for the educational system in general and teachers in particular. The policy therefore advocates a rigourous training programme (both pre-service and in-service) for teachers who in the final analysis have to implement continuous assessment. Two major problem areas may be identified, namely:-

- (a). Comparability of standard, and
- (b). Record keeping, and the continuity of records.
- A). COMPARABILITY OF STANDARDS: At present, the single national examination provides some basis for comparing the quality of student's performances across schools. Under a continuous assessment situation, such comparison becomes

extremely difficult. The difficulty arises from two main sources namely:-

- (i) Differences in the quality of tasks and other assessment instruments used in different schools, and
- ii) Differences in the procedure for scoring and grading the various assessment instruments in the various schools.

B) RECORD KEEPING AND CONTINUITY OF RECORDS

For continuous assessment to be meaningful, there has to be meticulous keeping of accurate records on each pupil. Secondly, since these records are expected to be cumulative from class to class and from school to school, there is the need for uniformity in the kinds of record kept and the format for keeping such records. There is therefore the problem that the educational system must expect several thousands, perhaps millions, of teachers to keep accurate records with a more or less uniform format.

Third, the fact that a child even within the same level of education, may move from one school to another, for example, if the parent are transferred to another town, demands that a mechanism must be involved to ensure that the record of the child from one school can be transferred to another school without removing those records from the first school.

CHAPTER TWO

2.0 CONCEPT OF CONTINUOUS ASSESSMENT

As discussed in Chapter one (1), Continuous assessment as a method of evaluating the pupils progress was proposed in the National Policy on Education, 1977. This chapter looks at the concept of continuous assessment from the view point that it will be well understood if the present system of assessment of pupils progress in the country, with its many weaknesses, is discussed. This discussion is then followed with a statement of the meaning and characteristic of continuous assessment. This is a natural lead too the proposed system which also indicates just what it is that should be assessed and gives an overview of assessment techniques.

2.1 DESCRIPTION OF FORMER SYSTEM OF ASSESSMENT

Africa (including Nigeria) in the old, education was mostly oral and informal. Tied up with this oral and informal approach was a system of assessment of achievement which was based on careful observation. With the arrival of Western education in Nigeria, Western methods of assessment were introduced in the form of two broad groups of internal and external examinations.

The internal examination was the type of test conducted by each institution for its own use in assessing the progress of its students.

In primary schools in Nigeria this type of test was conducted definitely at the end of the school year, usually at

the end of every term and sometimes every two weeks during the school year. But no matter how often, it was generally the result of the end of year test or examination which was used for making decision on the pupil. The situation with regards to the secondary schools was not difficult

It. One distinctive was that while in the primary schools the class teacher kept the marks, in the secondary schools, this was the responsibility of the subject teacher. In either case, when a decision had to be made, it was normally based on raw scores provided by teachers.

A second type of examination which operated in our schools system was known as the external examination. In general, this type of examination was conducted by agencies external to the pupils in the sense that they had not been responsible for teaching the pupils. Examples are the State Ministries of Education which, in co-operation with the Federal Ministry of Education and NTI, now conduct the teacher's Grade Examination, and the West African Examination Council which conducted the West African Schools Certificate and the General Certificate of Education.

2.2 SOME SHORT-COMINGS OF THE SYSTEM

It has been indicated that the test of examination is, for the most part, used as the dominant method of assessing pupils progress in this country. Our problem with this approach is that assessment is then directed mostly to the taught aspect of learning activities. knowledge, understanding and other thinking skills acquired in various subjects of the school curriculum are evaluated and marks are awarded relatively to pupils performance in the several subjects. Usually neglected in this procedure is the assessment of skills normally associated with both the character and the industry of the pupil. Here is are example. A person may know the dose of antibiotics which a patient should take (knowledge). Yet, if he loses his nerves at the sight of a bleeding patient(character) or cannot administer injection even after training (practice skill) he should advised against aspiring to be a nurse. Thus, when testing is used as an exclusive method of assessment, it may not be possible to get an overall picture of the person being assessed.

Another problem with this system of assessment is that emphasis is laid on the performance at the year, the term or the course. One shortcoming of this practice is that by the time a decision is made, it is too late to help pupils improve on their learning because most of them would be going on to other classes, courses or topics. As a result, the educational system (including the pupil, the teacher, the curicula and the administrator) is denied opportunity for meaningful growth. It is unwise and unnecessary to deny the educational system this essential feedback.

A third problem of this system of assessment or practice is to be seen in the manner in which reports are sent to parents and guardians. In primary and secondary schools the common practice is to add new scores, as given by different teachers, find an average and give the student a rank among his classmates on the basis of this questionable procedure. The problem with this is that marks obtained in different subjects or given by different teachers may not have equal weights. Thus, some students may be downgraded unnecessarily in rank because of the combination of subjects which they take. This is indeed a very important issue which will be taken up.

Another issue associated with the manner in which reports are presented to parents and guardians is that information provided is usually scanty. At best there are marks or letter grades indicating attainment in different subjects and an overall average which does not indicate much or indicates a false mark based on this average. All of these are geared to the thinking category or the cognitive domain of knowledge. In addition, in primary and secondary schools, there may be a statement on the conduct of the pupil which is just one aspect of what will be introduced as the effective domain. The practical skills of the student or what will be called the psychomotor domain in technical jargon, is generally ignored. Higher educational institutions do not normally go beyond cognitive domain.

Other weaknesses include 'EXPO' which has crept into the practice of assessment in this country as a symbol of National disgrace and poverty of the state of record-keeping. There is therefore, definite need for change of practice.

2.3 MEANING AND EXPLANATION OF CONTINUOUS ASSESSMENT

Continuous assessment may be viewed as the method of finding out in a systematic way what the pupil has gained from learning activities in terms of knowledge, thinking and reasoning, character development and industry. Various tools may be used to find out the outcome of these learning activities. These include tests, assignments, projects, observations, interviews and questionnaires. The data obtained on the pupil will then be used to aid his further development. Besides, accurate records of such data are filed for further use and for the purpose of providing information to the parents, guardians and others who can use then for the benefit of the pupils.

Given this information, a brief definition is that continuous assessment is a mechanism whereby the final grading of a student in the cognitive, effective, and psychomotor domains of behaviour systematically takes account of all his performance during a given period of schooling. Such an assessment involves the use of a great variety of modes of evaluation for the purpose of guiding and improving the learning and performance of the student.

2.4 CHARACTERISTICS OF CONTINUOUS ASSESSMENT

Continuous assessment, as defined above may be characterised as being :-

- (a) Systematic
- (b) Comprehensive
- (c) Cumulative

- (d) Guidance Oriented
- a) Being Systematic: Continuous assessment is said to be systematic in the sense that it requires an operational plan which indicates what measurement is to be made of the student's performance, at certain time interval or times during the school year. The measurement is made and the result recorded.
- b) Being Comprehensive: Continuous assessment is comprehensive in the sense that many types of instruments are used in determining the performance. As already indicated, these includes tests, projects, assignments, observation, questionnaire and interviews. another aspect of the comprehensiveness is that the student is seen in his totality because decision are made based on information obtained in the cognitive, affective and psychomotor domains.
- c) Being Cumulative :- Continuous assessment is cumulative since any decision to be made at any point in time on the student takes into account all previous decisions about him. This requires the keeping of up-to-date or cumulative records on each child.
- d) Being Guidance-oriented :- Continuous assessment is guidance oriented because information obtained is used to guide his further development.

2.5 WHAT TO ASSESS

Teachers, parents and the society at large expect changes in pupils behaviour in desired and desirable direction as a

result of what the pupils are exposed to in the school. The word behaviour, is used here to include all activities in cognitive, affective and psychomotor domains already mentioned.

In both Teachers and assessment therefore, the first step is to determine the learning outcomes to be expected from the students experiences in and out of class. The following questions may be asked. What knowledge and understanding should the student possess? What interest and attitude should he develop? What changes in habit of thinking, feeling and doings should take place? What skills should he be able to display? These four questions direct attention to some of the various aspect of the student and his development.

Specialists have, over the years accepted a classification of these various aspect which were originally proposed by B.S Bloom and others. These classification system or taxonomy takes development and separates it into the three domains of cognitive development, affective development and psychomotor development. Thus, any behaviour may now be viewed as belonging to one of the cognitive, the affective or the psychomotor domains.

2.6 THE COGNITIVE DOMAIN

There are six different categories in the cognitive domain.

(a) Knowledge: These may mean recall of wide range of materials, for specific fact to complete theories at post primary and higher level of education. All that is required is for the pupils to bring to mind the appropriate

information. Specifically, the pupil response by defining, describing, identifying, labelling, listing, matching, naming, outlining, reproducing, selecting or stating.

- (b) Understanding: Here a higher level of activity is required of the pupil beyond that of remembering or recalling materials from one form to another (words to number, or one language into another). Interpreting material (explaining or summarising) and estimating further trends. A pupil can show understanding by being able to rewrite passages or to give examples.
- (c) Application: Application is the ability to use learned material in new and concrete situations. The pupil does not only recall but is able also to use the learned material in a situation that is different from that of the original material.
- (d) Analysis :- Is the breaking down material into its component parts.
- (e) Synthesis :- Is the building up new material from given parts.
- (f) Evaluation :- The judgement of the value of material, statement, novel, poem, or piece of written material.

2.7 AFFECTIVE DOMAIN

The affective domain has to do with values and belief, attitude and appreciation, interest, social relation, emotional adjustment, habit and life style.

- i. Value: Is concerned with the worth a pupil attaches to a particular object, phenomenon or behaviour. For example, a pupil may desire to improve the skill of his group or may assume responsibility for the affective functioning of the group usually, the values a pupil in bided (internalized) are expressed in his outward (overt) behaviour. A behaviour that is consistent and stable enough can be seen as a learning outcome in the area of valuing values and belief come under instructional objectives classified under attitude and appreciation. That is to say, values and belief determine attitude and appreciation. In concrete terms, a pupil may value group work, demonstrate belief in the democratic process, appreciate local music show concern for the welfare of others, or demonstrate problem solving attitude.
- ii. Interest: This is reflected by active participation on the part of the pupil. Such interest leads the pupil to read assigned material voluntarily, read beyond assignment or read for pleasure or enjoyment.

It is interest that makes the pupil seek out certain activities and which enable him to enjoy them. The pupil we have in mind volunteers for special tasks, shows interest in a particular subject or enjoys helping other.

(iii) Social Relations: This refers to the behaviour of the pupil in the group. Is he loyal to the school? Does he show sprit? These are some relevant questions which help to determine the pupils social relationships.

- (iv) Emotional Adjustment :- What one will watch out for is the pupils reaction to favourable and unfavourable conditions. How does a quarried between the parents affect the pupils behaviour at school? Does he allow success to get into his head?
- (v) <u>Life Style</u>: When a pupil has a value system that has controlled his behaviour for a sufficient long time, he develops a lief style out of the system. This kind of behaviour is pervasive, consistent and predictable.

2.8 THE PSYCOMOTOR DOMAIN

The psycomotor domain deals with manipulative skill and body movements. Example of these are. Writing smoothly and legibly, drawing accurate maps and diagrams, setting up laboratory equipment, typing with speed and accuracy, operating sewing machines skilfully, playing traditional music skilfully, performing a dance step correctly, passing football accurately, demonstrating correct from in swimming, demonstrating skill in driving a car, etc.

The present system of continuous assessment, sets out to measure the extent to which the school is succeeding in making children develop desirable social habits and attitudes.

In addition, the skill which children have acquired in their games and sports, vocational and technical skill are assessed.

In assessing habit and attitude, the teacher needs to develop his skills of observation and bring them to full use.

This means the teacher has to interact with his pupils very

closely and frequently in the classroom, on playing group, dining places and so no. It may even involve visiting children in their homes in appropriate cases in order to verify or observation.

Assessment of skill and technique also involves a lot of observation and in many cases actual cheeking of result by using instrument or some other equipment made for the purpose. But it is more difficult to find out whether or not the joining of two pieces of wood is at right angle.

In all these, the skill or technique to be learnt must be distinguished from assessment tests for record purpose.

This present assessment system means more to the teacher in the following ways

- i He require more training in observation technique and their uses.
- ii. There must be frequent record of all that have been observed in respect of the activities of children with particular reference to their habit and attitudes.
- iii. He must be capable of writing standard tests and exercises in respect of every subject.
- iv. He must make more tests and exercises formally
- v. He must keep the accurate record of all tests and exercises.

CHAPTER THREE

SYSTEM DESIGN

3.1 NEED FOR COMPUTERISATION

In respect of the current awareness in the usage of computers in organisation, couple with the changes in information technology (IT), providing management information system (MIS), in-line with office automation/information storage and retrieval system to enhance productivities, computers have now become a catalyst of development for technological advancement of man. Computers are into every aspect of human endeavour complex calculations, statistical application, and management information system (MIS) etc.

Computer serve as data bank for essential information which are kept in an integrated data base for use in long and short

With the introduction of computer, timely information regarding the instructional material, continuous assessment reports, etc for both management and non management purposes, will be supplied to the appropriate user where it is mostly needed and useful.

3.2 BACKGROUND OF THE PROJECT

evaluations.

The standardisation of student continuous assessment is an integral part of the 6-3-3-4 restructured education system in the country. The process to arrive at the desired aim of this structure, involves the application of statistical calculation

which goes beyond human ability, because of the quantum calculations involved, and will continue to be involved, having in mind the ever-increasing growth in our educational population.

It is been observed that student assessment is practically based on the raw scores awarded by the teachers of various subjects. In view of the raw scores awarded by the teachers, it is difficult to access or compare student's performance in various subjects. This is due to the fact that various teachers have different ways of awarding marks to their students. A teacher may have a special interest in some of the students and thereby being liberal to them while marking their papers, whereas some students may be unlucky and have their papers marked strictly. Moreso, when we talk of two teachers handing different arms of a set of students, i.e Teacher 1 handles JSS IIIA-C and Teacher 2 handles JSS IIID-F for instance in mathematics, there is a tendency that one teacher. In this case, it is therefore observed that to eradicate this inconsistencies in students assessment, standardization of students raw scores must come into play, to enable us compare students performances is various subjects in each school in Niger State and to also enable us compare students performances in various subjects from various schools in the state.

To achieve the goal of comparability of students performance therefore, the students raw scores must be standardized by using the following mathematical expressions

given as a guide by the federal ministry of education, science and technology.

3,3 SCALING RAW SCORES :-

Score - scaling is the process of setting up a scale for interpretation of test performance by means of a set of numbers based on the performance of a reference group. The mean and standard deviation of the group are usually assigned

arbitrary scale values and other scores provided by the test are then placed on the scale.

A raw score is the direct numerical report of a person's test performance, eg number of questions answered, time required, count of right scores. Raw scores can easily be misinterpreted. An examination mark by itself has practically no meaning. The traditional belief that it has an absolute value, is without foundation. All that a mark of 60 percent conveys is that it is one of a set of marks which have a range within the limit of zero to one hundred. Whether the mark is to be reckoned as very good, good, or not so good, (high, medium or low) depends on how 60 is related to other marks by the class.

3.4 FORMS OF REPORTING SCORES:

There are two forms of reporting score presently in our educational system.

- 1. A lot of schools report only the rawscore. For instance, a pupils permanent record or the report card sent to his parents might contain the entry elementary mathematics, 60. The collated information that given 60 its full meaning is not reported and in such a case, a parents can only make the assumption that 60 in mathematics is the same as 60 in History.
- 2. Some schools, in addition to the pupils mark, report the class average or the pupils place in the order of merit. Even so, it will be an easy task for the parents to decide

how much better or worse is 60 in mathematics them 60 in History.

3.5 STANDARD SCORE:

It is offer difficult to compare scores from tests of unequal length (here, different tests on the same subject matter) unless we convent the raw score to a common scale. A standard score scale based on the mean and standard deviation is used. Also, use of standardized score scale enable us to add one standard score to another.

The scale that gives the number of standard deviations a score away from the means is called the Z - score otherwise known as zero one scale. The Z-score is obtained from the raw score by dividing the deviation score by the standard deviation of the raw score. This fact is mathematically expressed as:

Where, X - is the raw scores, M - is mean of raw scores and SD - is the standard deviation of the raw score.

Suppose we assure mean and standard deviation of a given set of raw score to be 33 and 3 respectively, then for raw score 40.

$$Z = \frac{40-33}{3} = \frac{7}{3} = 2.33$$

for raw score 25

$$Z = \frac{25-33}{3} = \frac{-8}{3} = 2.67$$

For continous assessment exercise, the standardized score is recommended. on this scale, the mean and standard deviation of scaled score are set equal to 50 and 10 respectively.

In the light of the preceding explanation, the formula for converting raw score to standard score otherwise called the T-score is stated as :
Standard score(T-score)=10z+50

CHAPTER FOUR

4.0 SYSTEM IMPLEMENTATION

Once the decision to go ahead with the computerisation of students continous assessment has been made by the management or the government, the team has to consider implementation of such decision.

4.1 INPUT DESCRIPTION

This is the process of converting an external user oriented input system into a machine oriented Format. The input consideration are greatly affected by the output requirement and the following factors should be born in mind

- 1. Data collection method and validation
- 2. Type of input media available
- 3. Volume of input documents

For this project, the input data are generated from the summary report of the JSS 1-3 program of students continous assessment raw score awarded by the teachers. The input data are equally attached in the project.

4.2 OUTPUT DESCRIPTION

This specifies the manner and the structure in which the information that leaves the system should be presented to the outside world or the users.

The design of the output depends on the information required, it should be known that the computer printout from the system depends on the output firm design.

After working with our input data and running of our programme from the previous chapter, i.e chapter 3, the output report generated the required T-score otherwise known as the standardized score, which is the target of this very project.

4.3 TESTING OF NEW SYSTEM

It is important that a system is thoroughly tested so as to avoid loss of time and money during live running. The various means of testing programme are :-

- a) Desk checking the various programme using test data. The test data involved in writing the program using live data. This is usually applied at the final stage of testing.
- b) The result of test with live and test data should be compared to the expected results, and all error corrected.
- c) A program trial log must be maintained by the programmer to record the result and progress of each program during testing.

4.4 TRAINING OF STAFF

During the implementation stage, the management must estimate the staffing need of the different activities involved. Some of the existing staff, if any may have to retain and train the so as to be whole need system. The various method of training might be in-house training or outside training. In addition, new staff might be recruited. The management must ensure that all the staff involved in the new system will understand the job.

4.5 SYSTEM CHANGE OVER

After the new system has been fully tested, change over can be made. The various methods of change over includes:-

1) PARALLEL RUNNING: - This involves the processing of the current line data on both the old and the new system at the same time and then cross-check the result to check the accuracy of the new system in the real situation.

The main attraction of apparel change over is that the old system is kept alive until the new system has been sufficiently proved for at least on cycle using full data in the real environment (i.e running live data).

It is safer their the direct change over since the current data is processed simultaneously by both old and new system and the result compared. Its main disadvantages are the extra cost and difficulty or impracticability of user staff having to carry out different clerical operation for two system in the time available for one and their cross-checking the result.

The use of extra may not be possible or derivable, and it is very hard to decide if may extra staff should be put to work on the old system or the new. The choice of parallel change over should never be use as an excuse for bad system testing. The system should still undergo to total testing before the change over period begins.

2) PILOT OPERATION

Pilot operation is to two types. The first can be described as introducing the new system in piece meal

fashion. It may be difficult to do this with an integrated system as a separate entity.

The other method can be described as phase out parallel running, i.e not so much parallel as consecutive. The new period and the result checked from the previous period and the result checked against the known original system. This s easier to control them parallel running.



5.3 BENEFIT FROM COMPUTERISED SYSTEM

This is an important part of system development and it involves:-

a. ACCURACY AND EFFICIENCY:-

It should always be bear in mind that accuracy is one of the factors that determines the introduction of computer. This system is therefore designed to meet this requirement and also produces information efficiently.

- The fact that all processes is computer based, all difficulties involved in calculating students continuous assessment is eliminated.

b) CHANGES IN ENTRIES

In a manual situation changes made in on paper work will require re-calculation of all affected data or the entire work sheet.

With application of computer system, entire/changes made on numerical data will trigger automatic re-calculation of the affected data and present the result instantaneously.

c) INSERT/DELETING OF RECORDS

Using the traditional method of paper work, adding or deleting of un-wanted records will call for cutting and pasting which will eventually require rewriting of the entire worksheet. The application of computer in this aspect will eradicate this problem as one can and a new record, amend or delete un-wanted record at any point leaving the system to readjust itself.

d) COMPARISON

The use of computer will greatly minimized the time consumed performing repetitive tasks, work.

f) PLACEMENT

The package (program) has an in-built decision marking process thereby marking students placement in schools to be based on individual students performance.

g) STANDARD LAYOUT

The result generated by this package, is not only readable and attractive, but at the same time a turn around document for easy and accurate storage of information on the data base management system with facilities to generate the report in a pictorial format, graphs ie (Bar, pie etc).

h) ADAPTABILITY

The designed system is flexible to accommodate any required changes at any time.

5.4 RECOMMENDATION

If the present system is fully operational, we will adopt the method of parallel change-over. Using this method the manual process will confirm, while the computer generated output of the same data will be compared with the manual to check and eradicate discrepancies in the computerised system before discarding the manual system completely.

This exercise will commence as soon as required by the Niger state ministry of education. The schools in the state will be divided into zones and actual data entry into computer will commence followed by editing and amending of report before the production of the results and summaries.

5.5 USERS MANUAL

NOTE: This program can only be run under Dbase IV.

- 1. To run the program, insert the assessment software package in drive A
- 2. At C:> type A:. then you press Enter or Return Key.
- 3. At A:> type install, then you press Enter Key.

The package will be installed to drive C, the system will automatically load Dbase IV and present the dot prompt.

- 4. At Dbase IV dot-prompt, type Do assess and press Enter Key. Here the assessment program will be loaded and present the user with be menu in an horizontal bar. ie,,
- The first row of the screen will present you the system status, where you see the position and the number of screen

available, Also the status of the database file is display between the screen and the system date.

- The main menu consists of four (4) options namely:-

A) DATA ENTRY MENU

On selection of the data entry, a pulldown menu will be displayed below the data entry option, the pull down menu consists of one option 99 Junior secondary school).

The system will pause to require the user to press return to activate the data entry form. Refer to appendix for data entry form.

- DATA VALIDATION

- i The system will not allow a duplicated candidate examination number.
- ii No empty record can be inputted to the database.
- iii At the completion of entering a record the system will pause and present a message (Are these entries OK Y/N)?. This is to allow the user to validate the entire data before being written to the database. On the other hand if the user respond No or N to the presented question record the program will transfer the cursor to the first field in the record and allow the user to effect the required changes.
- iv After the record has been written to the database file program will present to the user with a text (Add more record, Y/N)? This is to enable the user to decide either to continue entering another record or terminate the data entry process.

B) FILE UTILITIES MENU :

The file utilities menu consists of four(4) sub menu, namely.

- i) INDEXING OF FILE :- This is to allow the user to rearrange records held in the database in an orderly form.
- ii MODIFY OLD RECORDS :- This is to enable the user to effect change in an existing records.
- iii) DELETE OLD RECORDS :- This allowed the user to remove unwanted records.
- iv) INITIALISED FILE :- This enable the user to wipe out all records held in the database.

C) REPORT GENERATOR

This is to allow the user to generate report to the printer.

D) EXIT

This is to allowed the user to terminate the program and return to the C prompt.
